Code of Conduct – Company’s obligations to stakeholders

1 Commitment to the Code of Conduct

- 1.1 Ashley Services Group Limited (**Company**) endeavours to be recognised as an organisation committed to the highest ethical standards in business. The Company aspires to be a role model in conducting business honestly and fairly and is proud of its employees and of the professional reputation and market image built by their work.
- 1.2 This code of conduct (**Code**) reflects the Company’s high standards of professional conduct and ethics in dealing with all of its stakeholders, and its commitment to complying with all applicable state, national and international laws.
- 1.3 The Company considers its stakeholders to be employees, shareholders, creditors, customers, suppliers, contractors, consultants, governmental and non-governmental organisations, the communities where the Company and its subsidiaries (**ASG Group**) operates and other parties that have influence over or are influenced by the Company.
- 1.4 The Company is committed to compliance with the Code.

2 Responsibilities to shareholders and the financial community

Stakeholders

- 2.1 The Company is committed to delivering value for shareholders and uses its best efforts to maximise shareholder benefits.
- 2.2 The Company endeavours to have a positive relationship with its shareholders. The Company always attempts to respond to shareholders’ enquiries and requests as quickly as possible.
- 2.3 The Company treats all shareholders equally.

Disclosure

- 2.4 The Company values communication with its shareholders, other stakeholders and the public at large, and will fulfil its duty to make full, fair and timely disclosure of relevant information to shareholders and the ASX.

3 Employment practices

Equal opportunity

- 3.1 The Company is an equal opportunity employer. This means that the Company does not discriminate on the basis of racial origin, gender, age, ethnicity, marital status, disability, religious or philosophical beliefs, sexual preference or political affiliation. The Company considers allegations of harassment and unlawful discrimination as extremely serious and will take appropriate action.

Diversity

- 3.2 The Company promotes and supports a diverse workforce at all levels of the Company. It is the Company’s belief that creating a work environment that enables us to attract, retain, and fully engage diverse talents leads to enhanced innovation and creativity in our products and services.

Health

- 3.3 The Company has developed a set of core occupational health standards. These standards are implemented through education and training and are regularly reviewed. The standards are in compliance with applicable health laws, regulations and appropriate practices.

Safety

- 3.4 The Company ensures a safe and hazard-free workplace.
- 3.5 The Company adheres to comprehensive safety standards focusing on hazard identification and risk assessment. These standards are implemented through education and training and are regularly reviewed. The standards are in compliance with applicable safety laws, regulations and appropriate practices.

Training and potential

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3.6 The Company believes in enabling employees to develop to the full extent of their capabilities. The Company improves its employee’s skills and competencies by regular performance reviews and undertaking education, training and coaching. The Company recognises potential and offers professional development opportunities within the Company.

Use of Company funds and resources

3.7 Employees must not use Company funds, property, equipment, or other resources for personal benefit.

3.8 Employees should use Company funds sensibly and effectively. Employees must report expenditures accurately. The Company will treat submission of a fraudulent expense report as serious misconduct.

Confidentiality

3.9 Employees are required to protect proprietary, commercial and other information that is confidential to the Company. Obligations of confidentiality continue after an individual’s employment with the Company ends.

3.10 Information that is not publicly available concerning the activities, results or plans of the Company must only be used for authorised purposes.

Insider trading

3.11 Employees may become aware of material non-public information about the Company or one of its clients or customers in the course of doing business for the Company. Information is considered material if an investor could use that information to make a decision to deal in the securities of the Company.

3.12 Employees must not buy, sell or otherwise deal in securities in the Company or its clients or customers if they have such information about that company, and must not share that information with others.

Conflicts of interest

3.13 Employees of the Company are expected at all times to act in the Company’s best interests and to exercise sound judgment unclouded by personal interests or divided loyalties.

3.14 Employees must avoid the appearance of, as well as actual, conflicts of interest both in their performance of duties for the Company and in their outside activities.

Drug and alcohol use

3.15 Employees of the Company will not be under the influence of drugs or alcohol in any situation where they are identifiable as an employee of the Company or at any time in the course of their employment or employment-related activities.

3.16 Smoking is not permitted in the workplace.

4 Fair trading and dealing

4.1 The Company believes that the Company, the economy, and the public benefit if businesses compete vigorously and fairly.

4.2 The Company, its employees and representatives will treat customers, business associates and suppliers fairly and will not engage in anti-competitive practices that unlawfully restrict the free market economy. The Company is firmly committed to upholding the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010* (Cth).

Bribes

4.3 The Company's objective is to compete in the marketplace on the basis of superior products, services and competitive prices.

4.4 No payment in any form may be made or received, directly or indirectly, to anyone for the purpose of obtaining or retaining business, or to obtain any other favourable outcome. A violation of this policy will subject the employee to disciplinary action as well as potential criminal prosecution.

Gifts

4.5 Employees must exercise extreme care when giving or receiving business-related gifts.

4.6 Employees should exercise particular caution in regard to any offers of value, including hospitality, entertainment and gifts when the Company is negotiating a contract and so may be in a position to influence the outcome of a

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decision (whether directly or indirectly). There must not be an impression of an improper connection between any gift and business opportunities.

4.7 An employee must consider the monetary value of the gift, local custom and legal requirements when determining whether a gift should be retained or returned.

4.8 Employees must not request gifts from any party with whom the Company conducts business. Employees must not exchange gifts with the Company's competitors as this may create an actual or perceived conflict of interest.

Agreements with competitors

4.9 Formal or informal agreements with competitors that seek to limit or restrict competition in some way are often illegal. Unlawful agreements include agreements that seek to fix or control prices, allocate products, markets or territories, or boycott certain customers or suppliers.

4.10 To ensure compliance with the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010* (Cth), discussions with competitors regarding any of these potential agreements is a violation of Company policy and will subject the employee to disciplinary action as well as the potential for criminal prosecution.

5 Responsibilities to the community

Environmental protection

5.1 The Company respects the environment and protects our natural resources.

5.2 Wherever possible the Company prevents or otherwise minimises and mitigates harmful effects of the Company's operations on the environment. Compliance with all environmental laws and regulations is the foundation on which the Company builds its environmental performance.

Human rights

5.3 The Company supports human rights consistent with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the Company respects those rights in conducting the Company's operations around the world.

5.4 The Company looks for opportunities to support positive efforts to promote broader understanding of human rights values, especially where they assist the Company's local communities.

Support for the community

5.5 The Company has a strong commitment to the improvement of society as well as the communities it serves and in which it operates. The Company encourages the support of charitable, civic, educational and cultural causes.

6 Responsibilities to the individual

Collecting information

6.1 Collecting information on the Company's competitors from legitimate sources to evaluate the relative merits of their products, services, and marketing methods, is considered proper and often necessary to conduct business.

6.2 The Company considers the theft of information to be a serious breach of the Code. In addition, seeking confidential information from a new employee who recently worked for a competitor, or an employee misrepresenting their identity in the hopes of obtaining confidential information from a competitor, is strictly prohibited.

7 International compliance

7.1 Where the Company operates outside of Australia, the Company will comply with all local and international laws. Employees are expected to know and follow the laws of each relevant market where the Company operates.

7.2 If the standards in the foreign jurisdiction are lower than those imposed by Australian legislation, then the Company must comply with the Australian legislation.

8 Monitoring compliance with the Code

8.1 It is the responsibility of every employee of the Company to comply with the Code and to promote compliance with the Code.

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- 8.2 The Company has established a system for reporting violations of any of the Company policies and the Code, as well as any suspected misconduct by any employee or representative of the Company. This may be done in writing to the Company Secretary, the Board or appropriate senior executives.
- 8.3 The Company will not permit any form of retribution against any person, who, in good faith, reports known or suspected violations of the Code or any other Company policy.

9 Review of this Code

The Board will review this Code from time to time to ensure that it is operating efficiently and to determine whether any changes are required to be made. This Code may be amended by resolution of the Board.
